The Story ...

IT is always a daunting task to write the story of a Gilbert & Sullivan opera since viewed in cold type it always appears unutterably absurd. It is, however, in this very absurdity that the humour and appeal of the operas lie. Gilbert's secret, as has so often been stated, is to take a ridiculous situation and treat with the utmost seriousness. Given this principle, there is little need for jokes; the whole plot is a joke.

The absurdity of the situation in "The Pirates of Penzance" is that Frederic has such a strong sense of duty that he can be prevailed upon to do anything in duty's name. He has been mistakenly apprenticed to Pirate until he reaches his twenty-first birthday. When it is pointed out to him that, as his birthday is on the twenty-ninth of February, he will not reach his twenty-first birthday until he is at least 84, his sense of duty compels him to abide by the letter of his bond.

The opera opens with the pirates celebrating Frederic's birth-day. He is twenty-one years old and is to leave them after completing his apprenticeship. Ruth, his nursemaid, confesses that she made a mistake and apprenticed him to the pirate instead of the pilot. Frederick leaves the pirates and on his first excursion into the outside world finds Major-General Stanley's daughters on a picnic. He immediately falls in love with Mabel. The pirates return, find the bevy of beautiful maidens and decide to marry them on the spot. This is only prevented by the timely arrival of Major-General Stanley, who, having heard that the pirates are merciful to orphans, pleads for his daughters' release on the false grounds that he is an orphan.

The second act finds Major-General Stanley bitterly regretting the lie which he told the pirates. Quite apart from any question of personal honour, he is terrified by what the pirates might do to him when they find out they have been duped. Frederic announces that, with the help of the local police force, he is to march against the pirates and destroy them. It is at this point that Frederic is told of the "mistake" in his indentures, and despite the pleas of Mabel, returns to the pirates and a jubilant Ruth. There follows a battle between the police and the pirates in which the pirates are successful. The police however charge the pirates to yield in the name of Queen Victoria, and the pirates immediately do so. On hearing from Ruth that the pirates are "all Noblemen who have gone wrong," the Major-General immediately releases them and offers them his daughters in marriage. The show is provided with a rousing finale by the ensuing celebrations.



Twenty-Five Years of G & S

With this, the third production of "The Pirates of Penzance," the Society reaches its 25th consecutive Gilbert & Sullivan opera. During these years the Society has won for itself a reputation as one of the best Gilbert & Sullivan societies in the area.

The first show was produced at Hanover Street in 1949, when the Church Choir decided to extend its activities in this direction. The Choir chose "The Mikado" with Ella Burton as Yum-Yum, Alfred Smithson as Nanki-Poo, Irene Richardson as Peep-Bo, Olga Carter as Pitti-Sing, Mrs. A. Hirst as Katisha, Mr. Kenworthy as the Mikado, Reg. Carter as Ko-Ko and Stanley Lockyer as Poo-Ba. A number of those in this original production are still with the Society either as singing or non-acting members.

The early shows were produced and musically directed by Mr. J. W. Gillings. Since then the Society has had shows produced by Hilda Naylor, Vera Stubbs, Bill Dobson and most recently Barbara Thornton. The Society has had three musical directors, Mr. C. Carbutt, Mr. Charles Twigg and the present director Mr. Ronnie Whittam.

Mr. Twigg was with the Society for ten years, 1958-68, during which the Society produced some fine shows. Everyone will have his own favourites. Ones which stand out in my memory are, "The Gondoliers" (1961); "The Pirates of Penzance" (1962); and "Trial by Jury" (1966).

The Society has been fortunate in having a number of excellent principals who have given performances of professional quality over the years. Chorus work, too, has been of a consistently high standard.

This has been a Society which has enjoyed its work and this has been seen in the zest of the shows. Here's to another 25 years of laughter and music!
