A message from the President

Good evening ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to Utopia.

Our production this year is dedicated to the memory of Alison Sowerby, who died very suddenly last year. A tribute appears later in our programme.

Utopia Limited was Gilbert & Sullivan's penultimate collaboration, being first performed in 1893. Although this ran for 245 performances, it was not

revived professionally until 1975. It has been occasionally staged by amateur societies and we here at Batley performed the show in 1957. That being the case I can say that it is unlikely you will have visited the South Sea island of Utopia.

The score is enchanting and some of its themes are reminiscent of earlier shows, but there are many very different harmonies. It is said that this was Sullivan's most accomplished operetta. Utopia is the only show in which a character from an earlier operetta re-appears: I will leave you to spot who that is. Other G & S characters are also referred to.

The size of the cast is, perhaps, one of the reasons it has not been performed on a more regular basis. It has not been easy filling all the roles and I would like to thank those who have come to augment our membership to enable us to stage this rare production.

Without an audience, our efforts amount to nothing and I would like to thank you all for your support over the years. If this is your first time at Batley, you are very welcome.

So, sit back and enjoy your visit to the beautiful island of Utopia as King Paramount attempts to bring all that is English to the sunny south seas!

Alison Sowerby 1955-2009

Having begun piano lessons as a child, Alison became an Associate of the London College of Music, in turn passing on her enthusiasm and love of music to her many pupils.

She joined the Society as a teenager and first donned fairy wings in the 1972 production of *Iolanthe*. She was a proud member of the Society for almost forty years, holding the



positions of President and Secretary. She organised our house staff with great efficiency, always making sure people were in place where they were needed most. More recently she assisted her husband, Chris, in the role of Booking Secretary. Over the years she played parts in many of the shows and sang in our concerts. A selection of her roles is shown below, but her favourite was that of Mad Margaret in *Ruddigore*. Alison was also the holder of a long service medal awarded by the National Operatic and Dramatic Society (NODA). Alison's sudden death at the age of 54 last December came as a shock to us all. She will be greatly missed by all those who knew her. We dedicate our performance to her memory.

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Utopia Limited - the story

For many years, the South Sea island of Utopia has been the home of a languid and lazy people, ruled by a benevolent King who is, in theory, an absolute monarch. His power, however, is held in check by two Wise Men, judges of the Utopian supreme court, who have only to denounce him for any lapse from political or social propriety to the Public Exploder in order to have the King exploded on the spot.

The present monarch, a great admirer of English culture, is deeply in love with the English governess he has hired to teach English ways to his two younger daughters. However, the governess (Lady Sophy) will have none of him, as the present Wise Men have forced him to write anonymous scurrilous (and untrue) articles about himself in a sort of tabloid newspaper; and Lady Sophy, having seen the articles, believes the King to be much beneath her in terms of respectability.

This is the state of affairs when the princess Zara, the King's eldest daughter, returns from college in England. Indignant at her father's degraded position, she comes up with a plan. She has brought with her six shining representatives of English culture (the Flowers of Progress) in order to completely reform Utopian institutions. One of them is a Company Promoter, and under his remarkable influence every Utopian citizen turns himself into a Company Limited (complete with Prospectus) and liable only for the amount of his declared capital, which does not include explosion!

Once they realize that this implies that the King is now immune to being exploded, the Wise Men and Public Exploder are understandably annoyed. They rouse the Utopian citizenry to revolt, on the grounds that the country is so healthy under the new sanitation that the doctors are starving, and the new laws have so extinguished crime and litigation that all the lawyers are out of work, etc.

Suddenly, however, Zara realizes she has left something out of her perfect emulation of English society: Government by Party! "No political measures will endure, because one Party will assuredly undo all that the other Party has done; and while grouse is to be shot, and foxes worried to death, the legislative action of the country will be at a standstill. Then there will be sickness in plenty, endless lawsuits, crowded jails, interminable confusion in the Army and Navy, and, in short, general and unexampled prosperity!"

The populace is well contented with this proposition, and the Wise Men are led off in defeat. And so they all married each other, and lived happily (well, prosperously anyway) ever after.



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Tarara - Jeremy Shoesmith

Jeremy seems to have been around forever - from choirboy to the lead singer of a pop band to the amateur stage. Jeremy made his debut as Fyedka in *Fiddler on the Roof in* 1986 for Spenborough Amateurs. He joined Batley G&S in 1993 playing the role of Ralph Rackstraw in *HMS Pinafore* before going on to play both Frederic and Samuel in different productions of *Pirates'* Leonard Meryll in *Yeomen of the Guard*, Hilarion in *Princess Ida* and Luiz in *The Gondoliers*.






Calynx - Andrew Stopford






Salata - Catherine Roberts

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


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


Mr Goldbury - Steven Greenwood

Our Production Team

Producer/Director - Graham Weston

Graham's involvement in the theatre began at an early age and his love of Gilbert & Sullivan has led him to play patter parts in many theatres. He won 'Best Supporting Actor' at the International G & S Festival for his portrayal of 'Ko-Ko' in *The Mikado*. In 2006 he was invited to perform in the part of Robin Oakapple in a special production of *Ruddigore* at Buxton Opera House, which opened the 13th Gilbert & Sullivan festival. He has performed with or directed several local societies in the area, and has worked as Assistant Director to Alistair Donkin, former patter man for the original D'Oyly Carte Company. After performing the role of Bunthorne in a production of *Patience* in Ireland, future projects include *Half a Sixpence* and *White Horse Inn*. Graham is delighted to be back at Batley for his twelfth consecutive year.



Musical Director - Colin Akers

Colin started his musical life quite late at the age of eleven and at 16 went to Cheethams School of Music with joint first study instruments of piano and flute. From there he went to Huddersfield University and studied primarily music performance. He joined Halifax Gilbert & Sullivan Society in 1988, initially as accompanist, and was promoted to Musical Director in 2000 where his first Show was 'Yeomen of the Guard'. *Utopia* is Colin's fourth show at Batley, having directed us in *Patience*, *The Gondoliers* and *Pirates of Penzance*. 
John has become a valued member of our team and we enjoy working with him, Thanks for all your hard work!






From our archives

The role of King Paramount was taken by Clive Moul. Scaphio and Phantis were played by Geoffrey Greenwood and Charles Stuart Clubb. Joan Clubb and Barbara Newsome (later Moul) were the Princessess Nekaya and Kalyba.



King Paramount the First Robert Thurman

By performing in 'Utopia', Robert has achieved the distinction of having played principal roles in all thirteen of Gilbert & S ullivan's operettas. He has also performed with Halifax and Meltham G&S Societies and Heckmondwike Players, taking the role of Tevye in *Fiddler on the Roof* and most recently, Colonel Pickering in *My Fair Lady*. In 2005 he won a NODA award for his performance as Pooh Bah in Halifax's production of *The Mikado* - his favourite role.





Scaphio Malcolm Parkinson

Malcolm made his first appearance on stage as one of the children in *The King and I* with Dewsbury Collegians.

Since then he has developed his reputation within local G & S circles as a patter man but is equally at home in straight acting roles, music hall and other musicals and appears regularly with Dewsbury Arts Group.

Phantis - Richard Buxton

Richard began performing Gilbert and Sullivan with a number of middle-aged juvenile leads in Halifax and Huddersfield. He then graduated to playing late middle-aged juvenile leads before at last being allowed to act his age by a perceptive director. He relaxes after G & S by playing an assortment of psychopaths, megalomaniacs and dysfunctional husbands in Dewsbury Arts Group musicals. As Treasurer of Halifax G & S he is delighted, when in Batley, not to be desperately counting the audience every night.





Captain Fitzbattleaxe - Jonathan Wilby

Jonathan studied music at the University of Huddersfield. He has performed roles in operas ranging from Mozart to Sondheim, touring the UK in La Boheme, Tosca, Il Tovatore and La Traviata. Recent musical theatre includes roles in West Side Story, The Return to the Forbidden Planet, Fame, A Chorus Line, The King and I and Anything Goes. G & S roles include Frederick in Pirates of Penzance, Alexis in Sorcerer, and Nanki-Poo in The Hot Mikado. On the concert platform Jon has performed Handel's Messiah, Mozart's Requiem and Solemn Vespers, Mendelssohn's Elijah and Haydn's Theresienmesse.
