The Gondoliers - plot synopisis - Act I

The scene is a square in Venice, where a group of girls are busy making bouquets of roses. They have heard that Marco and Giuseppe, the most popular and desirable of the city's gondoliers, have decided to choose brides for themselves today, and these "floral tributes" are for them. Marco and Giuseppe arrive and flirt with the girls. They announce that in the interests of fairness, they will let luck decide who shall be their brides. They play a game "My Papa he keeps Three Horses" which is similar to "Blind Man's Bluff". This results in the capture of Tessa by Giuseppe and Gianetta by Marco, and the whole group exits to prepare for a joint wedding.

Into the empty square now steps the Duke and Duchess of Plaza-Toro and their lovely daughter Casilda. The Duke is an impoverished nobleman, and his retinue consists of a single attendant, Luiz, with whom Casilda is particularly haughty and severe. Having arrived in Venice, the Duke and Duchess explain the reason for their visit, revealing a secret which has been kept for the past twenty years. It seems that when Casilda was six months old, she was married by proxy to the infant son of the King of Barataria, a monarch who unfortunately then became a "Wesleyan Methodist of the most bigoted and persecuting type". Casilda's infant husband was abducted by the Grand Inquisitor to prevent his indoctrination into this sect, and brought to Venice. Now, however, the King and his court have been wiped out in a rebellion, and the Duke and Duchess have brought Casilda to Venice to reunite her with her husband and to see her take her place as the new Queen of Barataria. The prospect is relished by the Duke, who is so down-at-heel that he has decided to raise funds by turning himself into a Limited Company, a situation Casilda finds somewhat distasteful.

The Duke and Duchess enter the Ducal Palace, and Casilda and Luiz immediately rush into each other's arms. It seems they have a secret of their own – they are in love. Casilda, however, is a dutiful girl and realises that her affair with Luiz must be terminated. The Duke and Duchess return, accompanied by Don Alhambra del Bolero, the Grand Inquisitor who was responsible for abducting Casilda's infant husband and bringing him to Venice. As Don Alhambra explains, there is a slight problem. The family with whom he left the prince also had a son of their own of the same age. Thanks to a taste for drink, their father (or foster father in the case of one of them) became unable to remember which boy was his own and which was the prince. Both boys became gondoliers, and now the only person who can say for certain which is the prince is the nurse to whom he was entrusted and who just happens to be Luiz's mother. This lady is now the wife of a brigand operating in the mountains around Cordova, and she is to be brought to the city and made to reveal the prince's identity. Casilda protests that she has been placed in a difficult position, but Don Alhambra advises her to "submit to Fate".

They exit and their place is taken by the gondoliers, the contadine and the newly-weds. Don Alhambra arrives to explain that either Marco or Giuseppe is in fact the only son of the late King of Barataria. They are to leave at once, and until it is known which of them is actually the King, they are to reign jointly. Gianetta and Tessa are upset to learn that they are not allowed to accompany their husbands, but Don Alhambra assures them (not quite truthfully) that this is only until the identity of the King has been discovered. Marco and Giuseppe plan to remodel the monarchy to fit with their republican principles, and embark on a ship which will take them to Barataria.



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Act II

Act II is set in the Court of the Kingdom of Barataria, now occupied by Marco and Giuseppe as joint kings and their gondolier friends as courtiers. It is immediately apparent that this Court is being run on reformed lines: the two monarchs are expected to put in a hard day's work and everyone, regardless of their function, has a title. Marco and Giuseppe's happiness is completed by the arrival of the girls, bringing Gianetta and Tessa, and a banquet and a dance is planned to celebrate. They are interrupted by Don Alhambra, who is appalled at the republican slant being given to the monarchy. He tells a story about another place where the experiment was tried with the result that "When everyone is somebody, then no-one's anybody".

Don Alhambra now reveals that whichever of the two gondoliers is king was married as an infant to Casilda, daughter of the Duke of Plaza-Toro. Gianetta and Tessa, who have been eavesdropping, are naturally annoyed, and while Don Alhambra goes off to interview the nurse, an argument ensues.

Next on the scene is the Ducal party, now dressed magnificently. The Duchess reminisces about her early married life, then there is a duet with the Duke which reflects on their various money-making schemes. Marco and Giuseppe join them, and the Duke is dismayed at the off-hand way they are treated by their subjects and by the monarchs' lack of regal bearing. He gives them a lesson in deportment, assisted by Casilda and the Duchess. The Duke and Duchess then depart, leaving Marco, Giuseppe and Casilda to make awkward conversation. Joined by Gianetta and Tessa, they sing about their peculiar problem: two husbands, three wives.

Don Alhambra and the entire Court return, bringing Inez, the nurse who is now prepared to disclose the true identity of the King. Inez explains what happened all those years ago, when the prince was entrusted to her care, and reveals that the King of Barataria is ... but that would be telling, wouldn't it?

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
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Casilda - Anna Trent

The Gondoliers Painting Competition

Helen Fox - Producer

Helen has been involved with the Savoy Operas for as long as she can remember. Beginning in Essex with South Anglia Savoy Players at the tender age of six she can easily say it is in her blood. She has been performing Gilbert & Sullivan since she was 15, when she played a monk in the Finale Act 1 of Yeoman of the Guard. As part of South Anglia she won Best Supporting Actress at the Gilbert & Sullivan Festival in Buxton playing Kate in Pirates of Penzance and Best Comedienne at the Waterford International Festival as Leila in Iolanthe. Since moving to Yorkshire in 2004 she has performed with Batley Gilbert & Sullivan Society, playing a number of parts, her favourite being Mabel in Pirates. Gondoliers has always had a place in Helen's heart, her first principal part being Vittoria, staged in Rome with the Imperial



Players when she was 18. It was also her first show at Batley, when she played Casilda in 2007. Helen is no beginner to directing, having directed the Youth Section of Dewsbury Arts Group for seven years, a One Act Play written by our very own Carol Parkinson and last year, her first full length play. *The Gondoliers* is a double first, being her directorial debut of an Operetta and also Gilbert and Sullivan. She has loved working with Batley and hopes that this is the first of many with the group.

Nicholas Whitaker - Musical Director



Hailing originally from the North Riding, Nicholas began his musical education as a chorister at Wakefield Cathedral under Jonathan Bielby. While reading for an Honours degree in music at Edinburgh, he studied the organ with John Kitchen and conducting with David Lawrence. He also held a choral scholarship at St. Mary's Cathedral - the only cathedral in Scotland maintaining a daily, 'English' choral tradition. After postgraduate study down south (the Scottish weather was becoming a nuisance) he returned to his native Yorkshire in 2010. As well as directing at Batley, Nicholas holds a Lay-Clerkship at Wakefield Cathedral and directs his own choir, the Assumption Consort. In his free time, of which there is precious little, Nicholas enjoys real ale, cricket, driving his convertible and trying to shock societies with the violence of the socks he wears while conducting.

Marco - Paul Richmond

Paul has performed since he was a schoolboy and has played nearly all the Gilbert & Sullivan tenor roles with societies throughout the North and recently, in London. With his wife, Elaine, he enjoys branching out into the wider repertoire of opera and musical theatre. As a judge sitting in Manchester it's not surprising his hobby is the topsy turvey world of comic opera.



Giuseppe - David Parker

David is now an established member at Batley, having first played the role of Giuseppe in the last production of *Gondoliers* at The Little Theatre in 2007. He is well versed in the lore of Gilbert & Sullivan and has performed with many local societies, including Leeds and Wakefield.



The Duchess of Plaza-Toro Stephanie Roe

The Duchess remains one of Stephanie's all-time favourite roles, having played it three times before. In her view the solo in the second half is one you can really get your teeth into and the role provides a nice combination of duets and ensemble work as well as the odd bit of dancing. 
The Duke of Plaza-Toro Malcolm Parkinson






Don Alhambra Del Bolero **Robert Thurman**


